BOOKS FOR TOTS

7th Annual Children's Book Drive

Please help our chapter in its effort to collect new books for less fortunate children. We will have a donation box at our December

meeting and at the CBC Annual Christmas Potluck. Since these books are coming from Audubon, books that include birds or wild animals might be considered.

<u>What is Books For Tots?</u> It is a children's book drive designed to collect new books for underprivileged kids in Kootenai County. The books collected by Books For Tots are given to the local chapter of Toys For Tots and are distributed to needy children in the community (along with toys collected by Toys For Tots).

<u>What is our vision</u>? To broaden the minds of children by ensuring that needy kids receive brand new books for the holidays. The trickle-down effect of reading is powerful and everlasting, and we want children to be exposed to as many new books as possible.

<u>Goal</u>: To collect 8,000 kids books (infant -12 years). There are approximately 3,000 underprivileged kids in the county, and we hope to give each child 2 or 3 age-appropriate books.

<u>When is the book drive?</u> It will begin on November 1st and end on December 20th, 2013.



Our December meeting will focus on the Christmas Bird Count. The Idaho Bird Conservation Partnership: A Coordination Point for Bird Conservation in Idaho

What is the Idaho Bird Conservation Partnership?

The Idaho Bird Conservation Partnership (IBCP) is а recently-formed collaboration that represents a joining of "forces" to unite for bird conservation. In particular, a high overlap in priorities, objectives, and organizations has existed between the Idaho Partners in Flight (PIF) chapter, with expertise in research and monitoring, and the state chapter of the Intermountain West Joint Venture (IWJV), with expertise in habitat conservation and restoration. Given the current economic climate with regards to funding for natural resources, we recognized the need to help focus limited monitoring and restoration dollars to benefit many partners. Directed by a steering committee composed entirely of relevant professionals donating their 'in-kind' service, the IBCP is an emerging



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collaborative effort that seeks to blend the research/monitoring expertise of PIF with the conservation delivery expertise of the Joint Ventures, and build on these foundations with complementary tools such as outreach, education, and citizen science.

The IBCP is designed to contribute to the management, science delivery, outreach, and conservation of birds and their habitats in Idaho. In particular:

- The IBCP will provide leadership, interorganizational communication, organizational support, science delivery, outreach, and management to this conservation effort.
- The IBCP will strive to implement strategic management and conservation efforts that contribute to the achievement of high priority regional and continental bird objectives aligned with national and state bird conservation initiatives and Idaho's State Wildlife Action Plan.

To achieve the above goals, we have organized into the following seven working groups: **Conservation Delivery, Funding Acquisition, Information Management, Monitoring and Research, Outreach/Education/Citizen Science, Pressing Bird Conservation Issues,** and **State Wildlife Action Plan Revision**. The IBCP has been gaining momentum since early 2011 and we recently (November 2012) held our most productive "working" meeting to date, at which all working groups formulated and began progress on specific action items (ranging from THE FISH HAWK HERALD shorter- to longer-term goals). Examples of current action items/priorities include: addressing direct mortality threats such as uncapped pipes, maintaining flood-irrigated agriculture for wetland birds, developing a statewide database for completed and ongoing research and monitoring projects, and more.

We plan to continue to meet twice per year to sustain activity. Our next meeting will occur in the Fall of 2013 in Boise.

- Role: identifying/prioritizing pressing issues; field suggestions, rank issues, suggest actions, evaluate progress
- Has created initial ranked list with input from IBCP Steering Committee
- Top-ranking current issues: (1) uncapped pipes, (2) scientific bird collecting, (3) entanglement in monofilament, (4) info need for raptor distribution (migration & winter), (5) conversion from flood irrigation to center-pivot

State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) revision – *Rita Dixon (IDFG) and Terry Rich (USFWS/PIF)*

- Revised SWAP due 2015 and IBCP can play a critical role; revised list of Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) by December 2013
- Prioritization scheme to include criteria such as: social, political, and biological values; status; threat; urgency
 - Try to refine scheme for consistency across partners
- Range maps: exploring different sources (NatureServe, eBird STEM, Northwest ReGAP) for consistent use across organizations

"The Winter Raptor Survey Project is a collaborative effort sponsored and administered by the East Cascades Audubon Society out of Bend, Oregon. The primary purpose of this project is to collect population density information for the raptors (hawks, eagles, owls, and falcons) which utilize our region during the winter months. Regular surveys began back in the winter of 2004-05 in central Oregon, but now cover most of Oregon, Idaho, as well as much of Washington and Northern California. The data collected by this project can be, and is being, used by land and wildlife managing agencies to help guide their decision making processes.

These surveys, which are affectionately called "Raptor Runs", are carried out once a month from November through March by volunteers who cover a set route and record their sightings. Each route is typically 40-50 road miles and is intended to transect favorable wintering habitat for the large raptors; primarily the buteo hawks which are near the top of the food web and thus good indicators of ecosystem health. Monthly sightings are then complied and sent in to the project coordinator to be combined with the other surveys to create what has become an extensive database. The heavy lifting in terms of organization and data reduction falls on Jeff Fleischer as Project Coordinator who now oversees more than 250 survey routes in the region - that's a lot of miles and data!! To further his pain, Jeff has decided to upload previous surveys, as well as future routes, into eBird so that this information can be seen and utilized on a broader scale: at least he has now enlisted help as this is a monumental task.

Turning to our local "Raptor Run", we began surveying the Rathdrum Prairie last winter (2012-13) on a trial basis. Several of us (Janet Callen, Shirley Sturts, Doug Ward, and Judy Waring) developed a route, worked out the kinks, and are now settled for the coming years. We hope to include each month's survey as a regular Coeur d'Alene Audubon field trip so check your monthly newsletter for dates and details. Results of our surveys will be posted on the website as time permits. 
