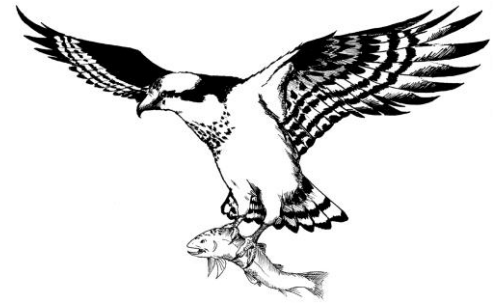

The talk will focus on the founding of the sanctuary and the work of New York socialite turned conservationist, Rosalie Edge. She was involved in the development of other parks in the U.S. as well, such as Kings Canyon in California, but was left out of many histories until recently. .

Overwintering Hummingbird New Study

The Anna's Hummingbird began expanding its original range of northwestern Mexico and southwestern California into Arizona during the 1930's, then was documented breeding as far North as British Columbia by the 1970's, and had its first reported sighting in Idaho in 1976. Presently, these incredible little birds are being observed annually throughout the Idaho panhandle and

Southwestern Idaho. Sightings reported on ebird.com suggest that the range expansion is continuing, and we would like to document the progress of this population growth.

Our goal is to build upon birdwatchers' documentation of winter feeder observations by trapping and tagging the hummers. These efforts will help provide more detailed information that would otherwise be limited through feeder observation only. Though the project's main focus is the occurrence of Anna's Hummingbirds in Idaho, we will also be documenting observations of any hummingbirds seen throughout the winter. Once tagged, not only will the dedicated birdwatcher be able to document feeder presence, but also report on return visits from color-marked birds.

As we begin to launch this new exciting study on the range expansion of the Anna's Hummingbird, we invite you to join us in these collaborative efforts. It was great having 28 birders turn out for our count on December 14th. We divided up into 7 teams which gave us good coverage of our area. This is the 25th year of this count which was started by Susan Weller at the same time that she formed the Coeur D'Alene Audubon Chapter.

Some our best birds are as follows:

Lesser Black-backed Gull -1st time on count but 2 times during count week.

Anna's Hummingbird - 1 at Doug Ward's feeder - 2nd time on the count - 2 last yr.

Eurasian Collared-Dove - Six, 1st showed up in 2009. They increased to 169 this year,

Pine Grosbeak - 10 on Tubbs Hill.
