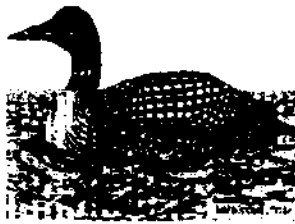

CONSERVATION NOTES

from Mike Mihelick

I drove to West Yellowstone, MT at the end of September to attend the fall Idaho Audubon Council meeting. Approximately 30 people were in attendance, with special guests Bob Turner, Regional Vice President for the Rocky Mountain Regional Office and Brian Peck, endangered species coordinator and also with the Regional Office.

Discussions on Saturday include threats to the Endangered Species and the status of Wolf recovery in Idaho. On Sunday a number of the attenders visited the Park.

The Idaho Audubon Council works to represent 2500 Idaho Audubon members on a number of environmental issues, and I am the CDA representative to the IAC. One of the highest priorities of IAC is to have better communications among each Audubon Chapter and also with IAC. Kay Ingram from the Snake River Audubon is the present IAC President. Among the items that are needed to meet this goal are a fax machine and e-mail capability for each chapter.

The Coeur d'Alene Chapter could use a fax machine and if there is a member who has access to an extra machine, or would like to donate a machine, please call me at 664-4741.

The National Audubon Society was founded in 1905. The organization is named for John James Audubon (1785-1851) famed American Naturalist, explorer, and wildlife artist.

ADOPT A WETLAND ACTIVITIES ON MICA BAY

Shirley Sturts is organizing adopt a wetland activities on Mica Bay. Activities will include the following:

- a. twice a month birding trips for the purpose for making a species list
- b. point count during the breeding season
- c. clean up (twice a year)
- d. building bird houses - both Wood Duck and song birds
- e. putting up bird houses
- f. cleaning Wood Duck Houses
- g. looking into the possibility of building and maintaining a viewing blind

Starting right away is the year round birding survey. The survey will be done the first and third week of each month. Participants can sign up to go out sometime between the 1st and 7th of each month and/or the 14th and 21st of each month. If you don't feel confident in your bird identification skills and still want to participate in the surveys you can sign up as a helper. An extra pair of eyes are always welcome and it is good way to learn to identify birds.

ECOLOGY WORKSHOP SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED

As part of its commitment to conservation and education the Coeur d'Alene Audubon will be offering a scholarship to send an educator or future educator to an Ecology Workshop in the Rockies. This is a one week camp of natural history experiences and environmental education. Participants stay at the Wyoming Mountain Wildlife Conservation Camp operated by Wyoming Fish and Game Department in cooperation with the National Audubon Society.

Our Chapter would like to make this an annual award and present it as a memorial scholarship or scholarship fund. We are looking for donors who would be interested in funding the

scholarship (in part or in full) and in naming it. The workshop currently costs \$700.

CDA CHAPTER ENRICHES SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The CDA Chapter has provided "Audubon Adventures" to 118 3rd and 5th grade classrooms in area elementary schools. Districts receiving these educational materials include CDA, Post Falls, Lakeland, Kootenai, Mullan, Wallace and Kellogg. Each teacher and classroom will receive six units of study. A unit includes 32 newsletters/work sheets and a teacher's guide of information and suggested activities. Subjects cover a wide range of topics such as recycling, migratory birds, sea turtles, deciduous trees, spiders and butterflies.

This educational project has been made possible by the generosity of the Margaret W. Reed Foundation.

HABITAT IMPROVEMENT ON BLACKWELL ISLAND

Seven Audubon members joined other citizens and BLM employees Scott Robinson and Bill Cook in planting about a 1000 bushes including willow, red-osier dogwood douglas spirea and rose on Blackwell Island. The BLM is also working on knapweed control.

AUDUBON HELPS FORESTRY CLASS

Five Audubon members helped the forestry class from Cd'A High School survey the birds on 20 acres of land that they are making a management plan for. Our list of birds was low due to rain. Birds included: Pileated Woodpecker (holes only), Raven, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Black-capped Chickadee, Golden-Crowned Kinglet, and Varied Thrush (after students had left).

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

GAMBLIN LAKE

September 30

Report from Judy Waring

Eleven hardy birders gathered on a not-too-promising day, canoes in tow, for a fall field trip to Gamlin Lake on the last day of September. Present were Nancy and Bruce Cergl, Janet Callen, Chris Buchler, Shirley Sturts, Phyllis Spring, Dick Hoskins, Don Matthews, Cindy Langlitz, Judy Waring and Janice Hill. Janice is employed by the Nature Conservancy and told us about the purchase of this piece of property as a refuge for wildlife.

As it turned out, we had a four hour break from the rain and toured the lake and interesting shore areas, getting only slightly damp.

Birds seen and heard: Canada Geese, Ring-billed Gull, Raven, Pied-billed Grebe, Red-winged Blackbird, Bald Eagle, Marsh Wren, Wood Duck, Ring-necked Duck, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Northern Flicker, Belted Kingfisher, Mallard Duck, Am. Robin, Hairy Woodpecker and Swallow (unidentified specie).

Purcell Mountains

October 15

Report from Shirley Sturts

The fall colors made the drive through the Purcell Mountains a delightful day for the six Auduboners that ventured forth. Participants included Gorden and Pam Comrie, Corine Cameron, Kris Buchler Gertie Hanson and Shirley Sturts.

Our first stop, Smith Lake was the most productive. We counted 1 female Goldeneye, 1 Pygmy Owl, 1 Pileated Woodpecker, 1 Northern Flicker, 1 Raven, 4 Gray Jay, 2 Red-breasted Nuthatch, 7 Red Crossbills and a flock of 20 unidentified songbirds (Possible Pine Siskin) At Bush Lake we picked up 4 Mallards, 8 American Wigeon, 4 Ring-necked ducks an Osprey nest (no Osprey) and chickadee sp.

As the morning progressed the beauty of the trees continued to enchant us but the birding became less exciting. At Robinson Lake we added to our list: 1 Belted Kingfisher, 4 Gray Jays, 5

Golden-Crowned Kinglets and 8 Evening Grosbeak. Driving along the Moyie River we added an American Dipper and one Ruffed Grouse (just killed by a hunter).

Leaving the Moyie River we wound up a mountain road to a parking area for Queen's Lake. The 1/4 mile (advertised in our directions) turned out to be at least a mile hike into the lake. They had closed off part of the road and not marked it. Gorden urged us on and we eventually came to the lake. On our hike we counted 1 Northern Flicker, 1 Hairy Woodpecker, 1 Gray Jay and 5 of the same mystery birds we saw at Smith Lake. They looked like large Pine Siskin. The sun was going down when we reached Dawson Lake but we had enough light to count 5 Pied-Billed Grebes.

As dark came, hunger descended on us as well. Gertie said she knew a good pie place in Bonners Ferry, so we returned our binoculars to their cases and set off in haste.

Mica Bay

October 28

Bryan Hemlich, of Idaho Fish and Game, led a large and enthusiastic group of Auduboners on a tour of our newly adopted wetland, Mica Bay. Many interesting possibilities for our involvement in preserving and enhancing this area were raised. After a walking and birding survey of the property a sign was erected at the waters' edge signifying our commitment to this important habitat.

We then accepted Helen Delaneys kind invitation and enjoyed some excellent soup at her home which adjoins the public boat access at the bay.

Birds identified:

N. Shrike, Tree Sparrow, Blue Heron, Brewer's Blackbird, Song Sparrow, Raven, Black-capped Chickadee, Mallard, Canada Goose, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Red-necked Grebe, Kingfisher, Bufflehead and Red-tailed Hawk.

Birds found included Pygmy Nuthatch, Cedar Waxwing, Starling, Crow, House finch, California Gull and Ring-billed Gull.

A biting cold wind greeted our group as we got out of our cars at the Third Street Boat Ramp, but we soon found it very pleasant as we got on the lee of the hill. Or was it the short steep climb to the fire protection trail that warmed us up? Anyway it turned out to be a very nice day to be on the hill.

Eight people showed up for the walk, including two from the Spokane area. To make up for the lack of birds--we think we saw some Golden-crowned Kinglets high in a tree and we did see Nuthatches and Gulls---I showed the group the site of the home of Mr. Tubbs, identified trees and bushes, and talked about the geology and formation of the lake.

There really are a number of birds on the hill, let's try the other side in the spring.

TO RAISE A SWALLOW



Part 3 of a series

16 July I think my swallow may be a Violet-Green. He has a wash of grey underneath the white feathers on his chest and belly. Also, the line through his eye is not so solid anymore. What an enormous appetite for such a small creature. On average, he eats the following menu every day: 1 box meal worms, 15 crickets, 15 moths, 25 flies, 50-100 mosquitoes, 3 yellow-jackets, 3 lace wings, 3 crane flies, 6 ants, and additional various and sundry beetles and bugs. I have enlisted the help of Noah and Hailey Couser, and a neighbor boy named Josh Mullen. Josh was very helpful and collected insects for a whole week, earning about \$25 to take on vacation. Without the help of these kids, I'd be even more worn out than I already am. I've got a good case of sleep deprivation going, and have had to cancel three eye-appointments, a dentist appointment, a camping trip, and one canoe trip down the river with Dick Hoskins.

17 July According to my calculations, my swallow is 21 days old and should fledge any day now. I put his box up outside on the house by my bedroom window. He was starting to fly all around the bathroom, and was ready. He became immediately wary when placed outside. He still sits in the hole of his nest box, but his peeping is greatly subdued. He sleeps inside the box cavity though, rather than sitting in the hole like he did indoors. He sees basically the same scene as he saw outside the bathroom window, but he has a lot more to entertain him and seems quite content. I saw him take a snap at a gnat, and he is tracking bugs with his eyes. He still chortles when I put him down for the night, I can hear him down in his box snuggling and chirring.
