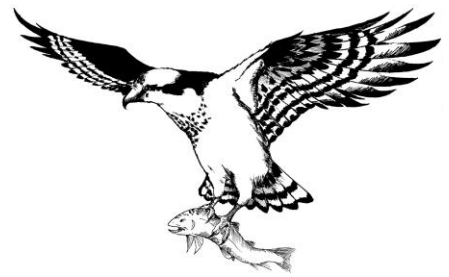

## President's Letter



I'm here at my desk looking out at our birch tree full of bright yellow-green leaves sparkling in the sun. We're now in full fall glory. I love this season, both for the color and for the cool crisp air. The wave of migration is now largely over except for ducks and geese, and hunting season on them is underway. The songbirds are mostly gone until next spring. The Cornell Ornithology Lab magazine *Living Bird* reports that 4 billion birds will have crossed into the US from Canada this fall and 4.7 billion will have left the US moving south. While we are appalled at the destruction to communities in the southeast by hurricanes Florence and Michael, it also occurs to me that millions of migrating birds must have perished as well. I know they can sense approaching storms, but where do they hide from storms that broad and violent?

Most of us don't stop to think about what an amazing feat the birds' migration is. I recently read "Are We Smart Enough to Know How Smart Animals Are?" By Frans DeWaal. In it he criticizes psychologists who conduct experiments on animals that do not relate to the animals nature and how the animal lives. It occurred to me to devise some experiments to be administered to humans that don't fit in any way with our capabilities and how we live. So, suppose we take a group of high school students, blindfold them, and deposit them on an open field at dusk. We take off their blindfolds and present them with an ultra-lite flying machine full of gas that will take them 100 miles. Then we instruct them to fly south to Moscow 90 miles away where they are to land. If they make it they are judged to have migrated successfully. If they don't they are judged to be lost and condemned to spend the winter in the frozen north. I've been assured by the few folks to whom I've mentioned this idea that no one would make it.

It is a ridiculous idea, of course, but it makes that point that birds as they migrate a thousand miles to return to their home tree on their home mountainside are doing something remarkable which we cannot begin to do and have trouble comprehending how they do them.

With that thought, enjoy the beautiful fall weather and keep looking for our amazing feathered friends as they make their remarkable journey back south.

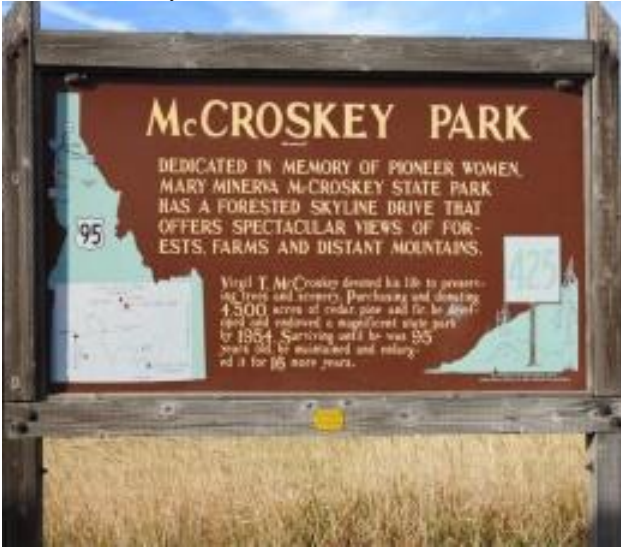

Two cars headed south to Mary Minerva McCroskey State Park on a gorgeous fall morning. After a brief stop at the rest area we headed up to Skyline Drive. Driving into the forest, there wasn't much bird action. The views were spectacular, with lots of color on the surrounding hills. We had a picnic lunch after hiking a short dirt-bike trail. Finally we began to spot some bird action as we got into open areas. We had a good look at several species: Hairy Woodpecker, Red-breasted Nuthatch and best of all an American Kestrel.

We could view the settling ponds in Tensed from the mountain. After making our way to the ponds, we saw only Canada Geese and Mallards! It was a perfect day for a drive to a place I had always wanted to visit. McCroskey Park is a treasure we are lucky to have. (Vera)

For the day, we identified 18 species including a Steller's Jay, several raptors, American Crow, Common Raven and Black-billed Magpie. We had spectacular views of Washington and Idaho.

## Coeur d'Alene Christmas Bird Count

**Date:** December 15, Saturday.

**How to participate:** We need to cover a circle with a 15 mile diameter, the center being CDA Memorial Gardens 7315 N. Government Way. You can join a team of 2-4 to cover an area within the circle, count birds at your feeder (choose the amount of time you want to spend), carve out a neighborhood or area to do on your own or with a friend for any amount of time you want to spend. Team choices:

1. Spokane River from the Highway 95 Bridge to Post Falls including part of the town of Post Falls
2. Spokane River east of the Highway 95 bridge both sides (dike road and Cougar Bay to Kidd Island.
3. City Park and Beach to Silver Beach and Fernan Lake, covers McEwen Park and Sanders Beach plus neighborhoods
4. Fernan, Stanley and Cherry Hill to Hayden Lake - covering Dalton Gardens - and Hayden Lake
5. Going around Hayden Lake
6. and 7. Rathdrum Prairie.
